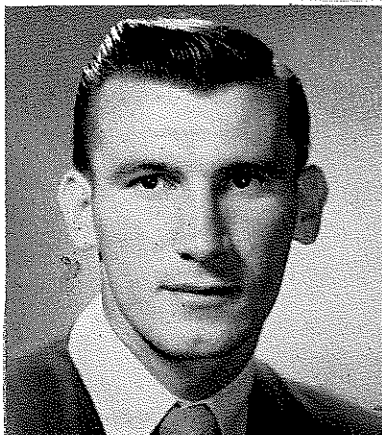
**RICHARD THOMAS, qb**

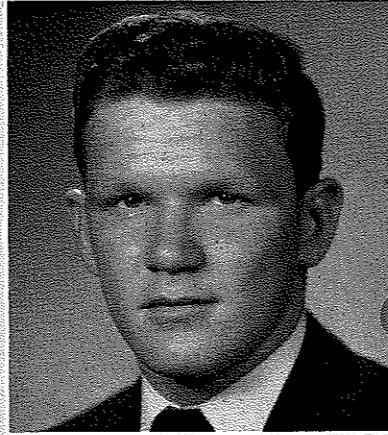
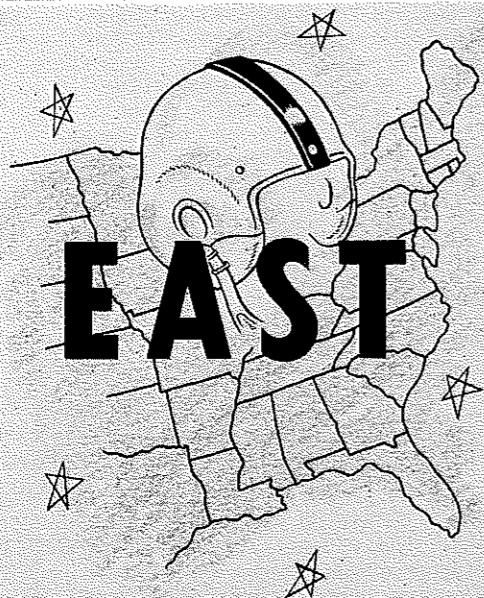
**GEORGE JACOBY, f**

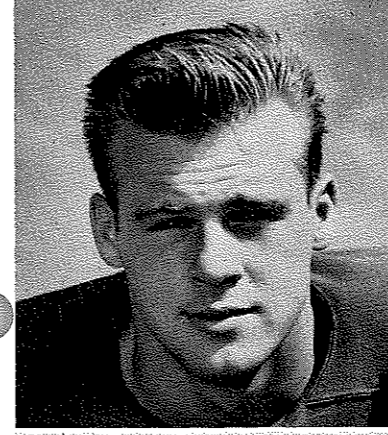
**JOHN GRAMLING, b**

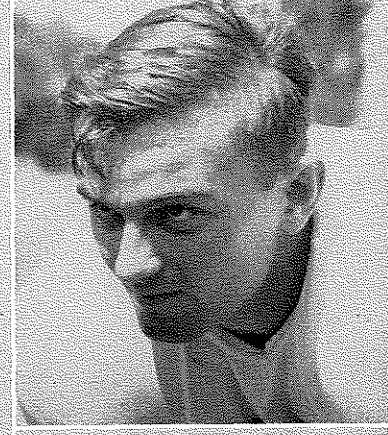
**PETER STARK, qb**

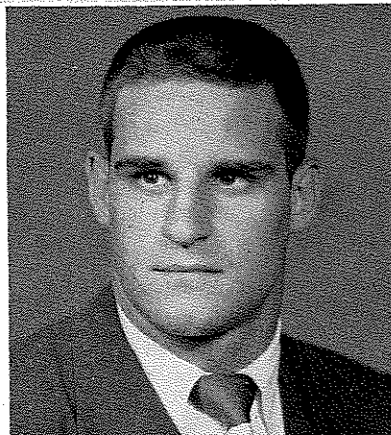
**JOHN RYAN, e**

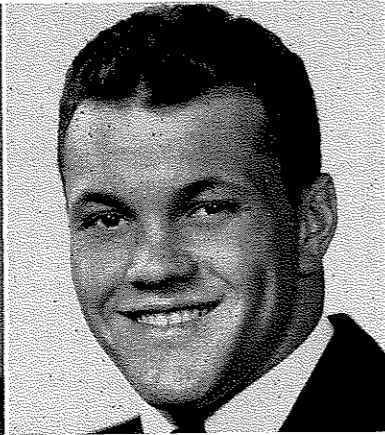
**LOUIS PETROKA, b**

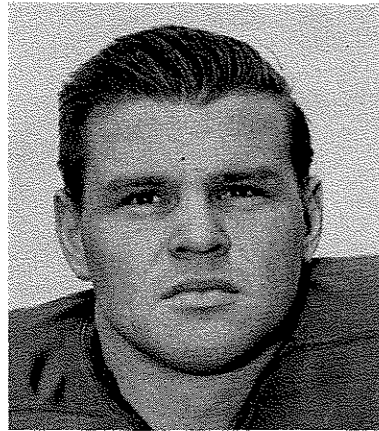
**ROBERT LENZI, f**

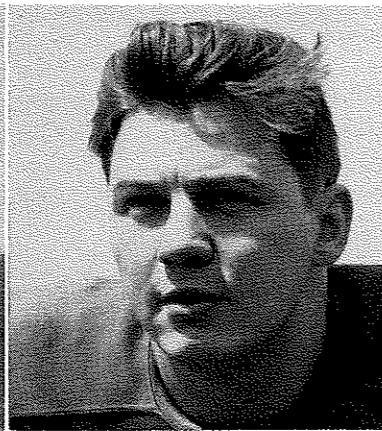
**DON CHELF, t**

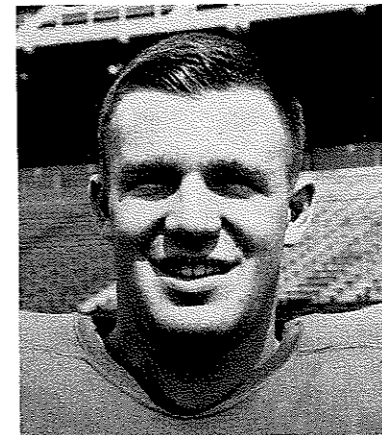
**JERRY HILGENBERG, c**

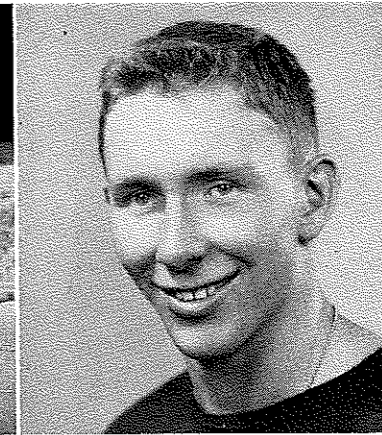
**STEVE MEILINGER, b**

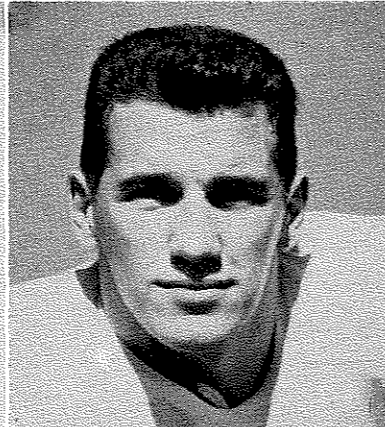
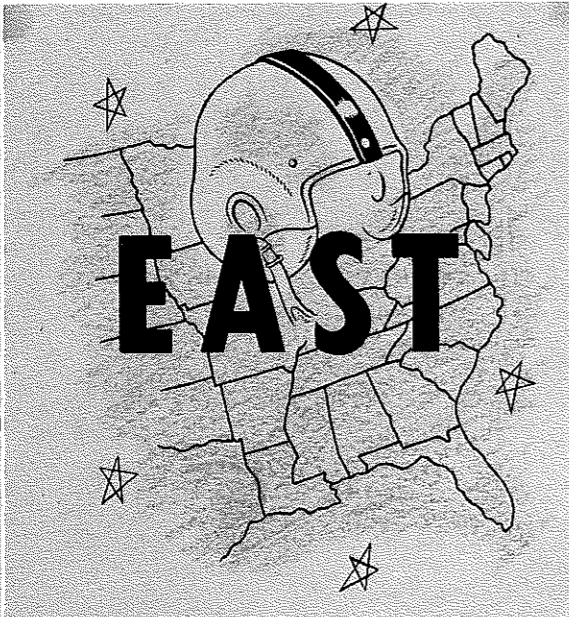
**THOMAS HAGUE, e**

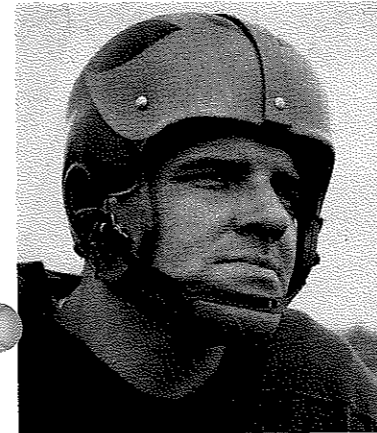
**JOHN LATTNER, b**

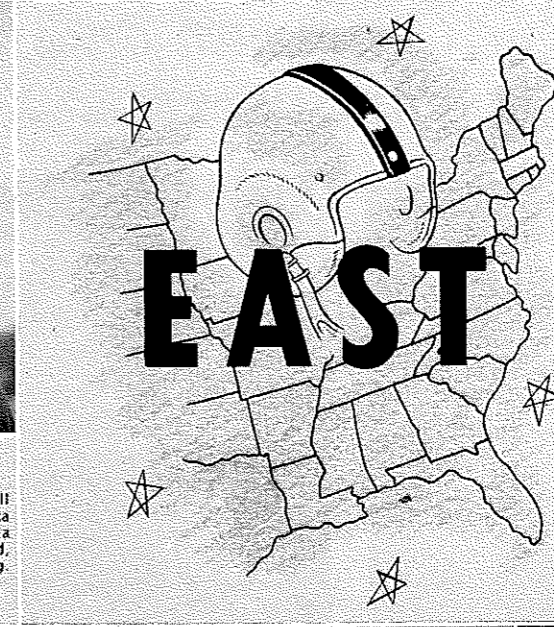
**ROBERT FLECK, g**

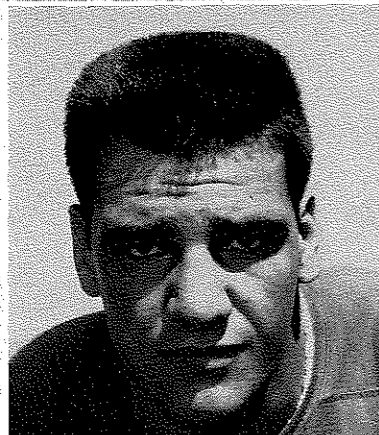
**HENRY LEMIRE, e**

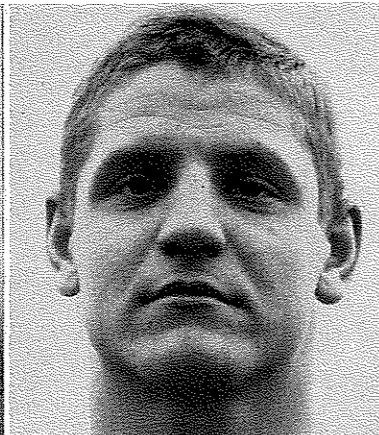
**DON DUGGER, g**

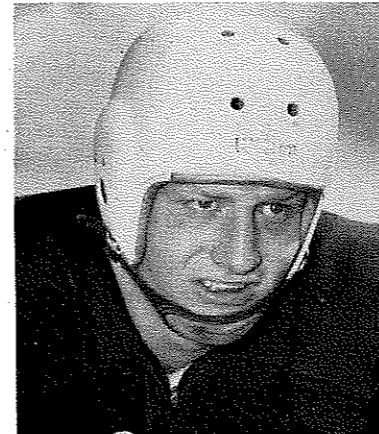
**JOSEPH JOHNSON, b**

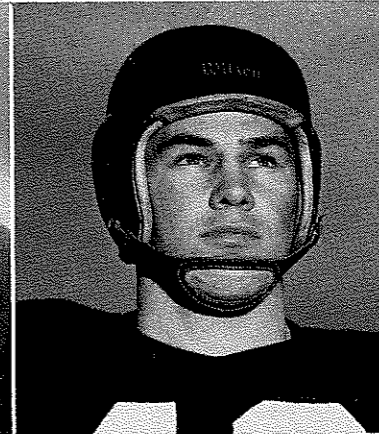
**ARTHUR HUNTER, f**

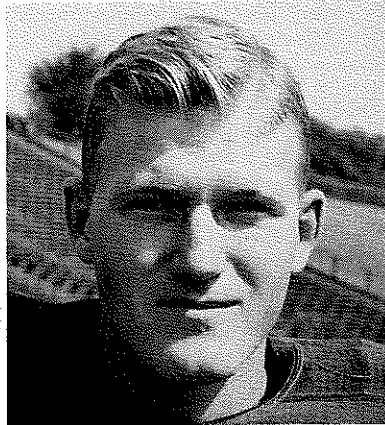
**RAY CORRELL, g**

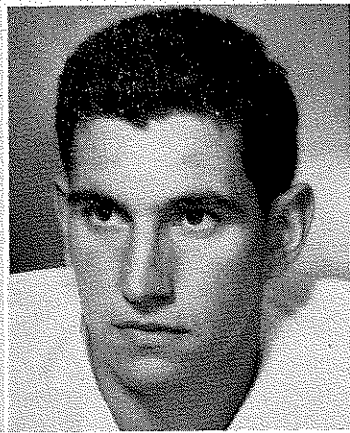
**GENE FILIPSKI, b**

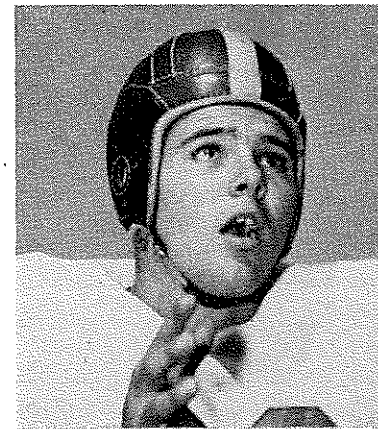
**HENRY SCHMIDT, Trainer**

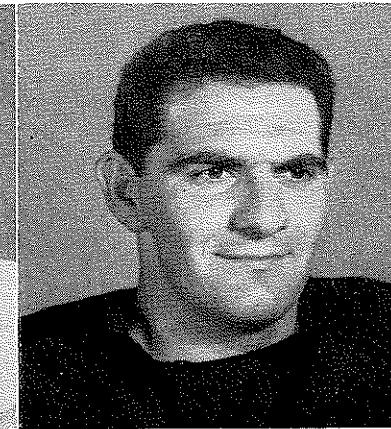
**SAM MORLEY, c**

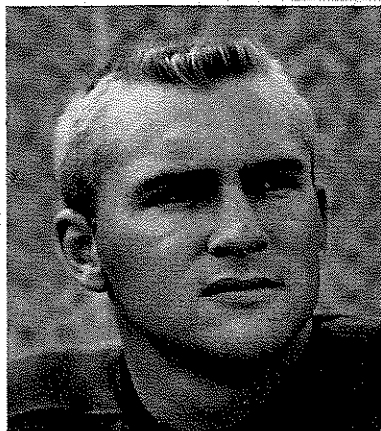
**MILTON BOHART, g**

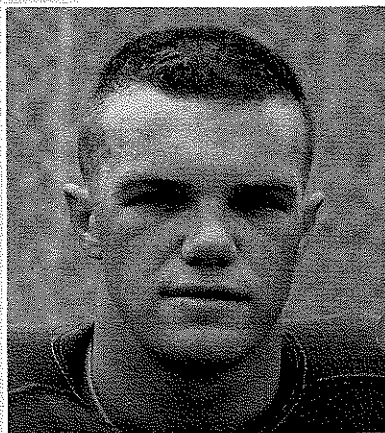
**TOM NICKOLOFF, e**

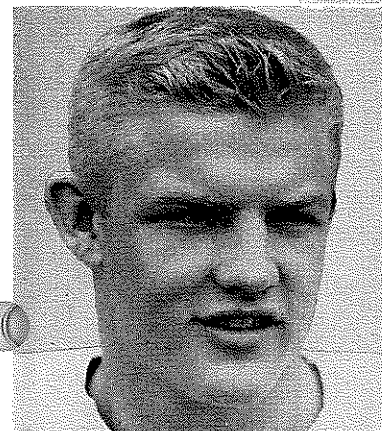
**JIM KOTLER, f**  
**CALIFORNIA.** One of the Golden Bears' outstanding linemen. (Kotler replaces Dick Day on West squad, and will wear jersey No. 76).



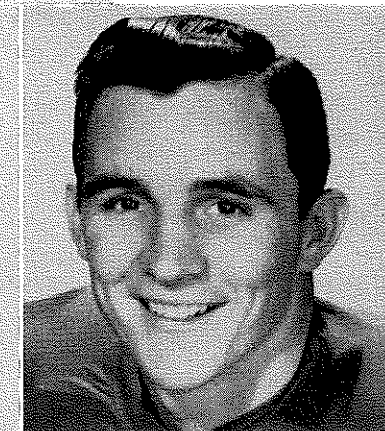
**ROBERT GARRETT, qb**

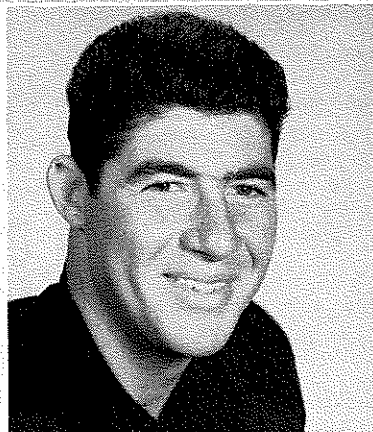
**TED TANNER, c**

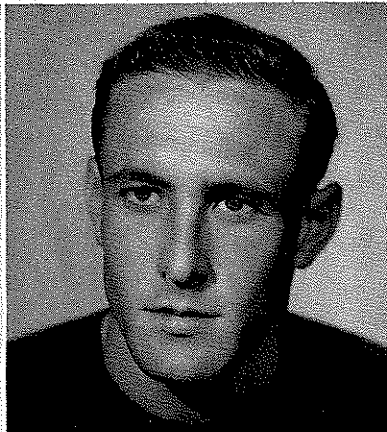
**ROBERT HANTLA, g**

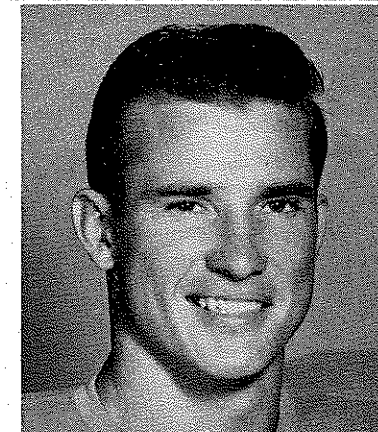
**JERRY NORTON, b**  
**SOUTHERN METHODIST.** One of Southwest's leading rushers and punters for three seasons. Developed into outstanding defensive player during 1953 season.



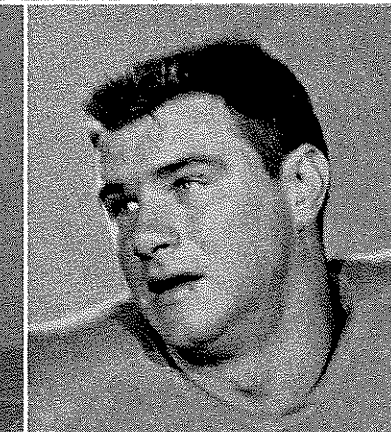
**AL TALLEY, b**

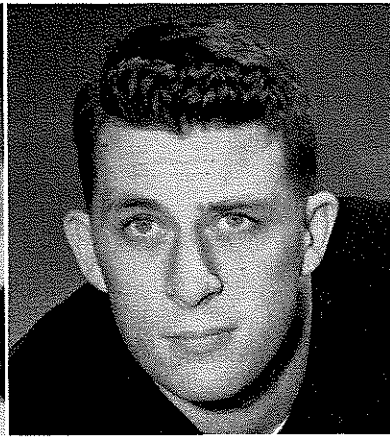
**CARLTON MASSEY, e**

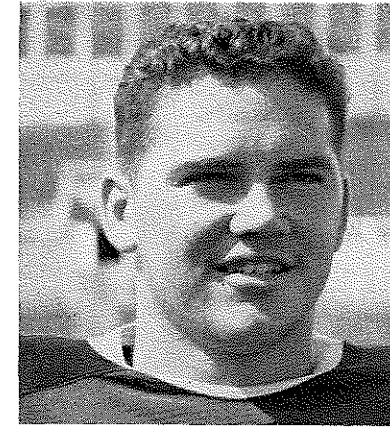
**PHIL BRANCH, g**

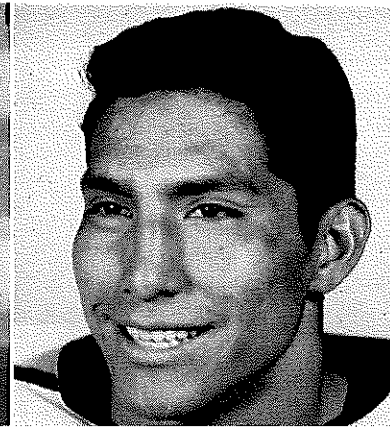
**ARTHUR LIEBSCHER, b**

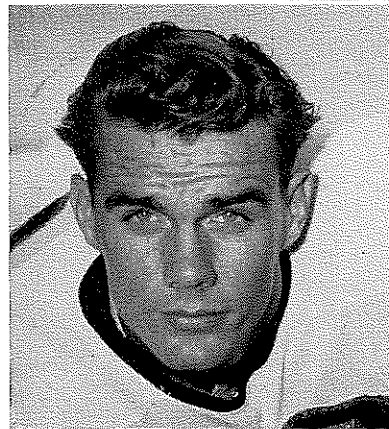
**DEAN CHAMBERS, f**

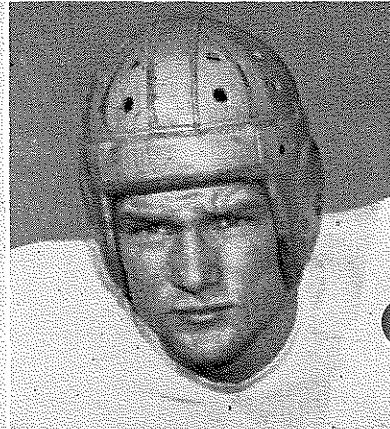
**MORGAN WILLIAMS, f**

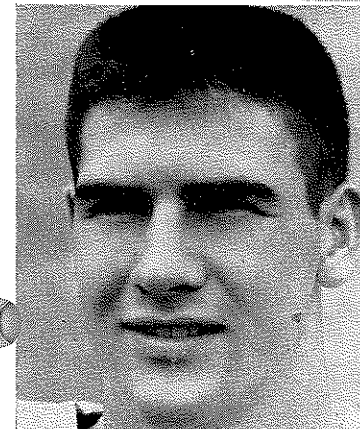
**WILLIAM BREDDE, b**

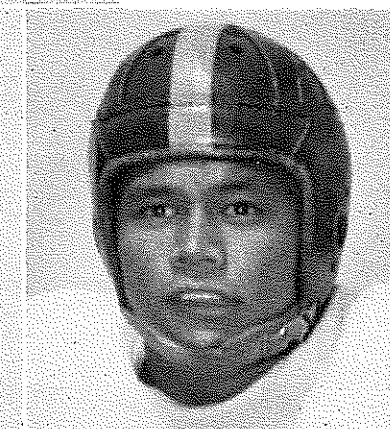
**GARY KNAFELC, e**

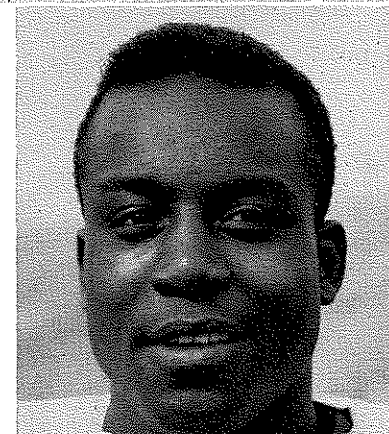
**STANLEY SHERIFF, c**

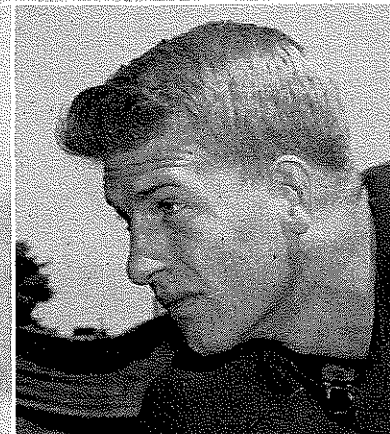
**MORRIS KAY, e**

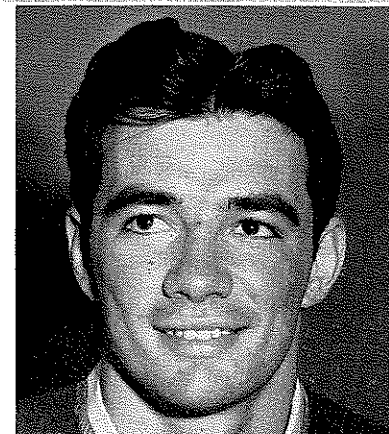
**HAROLD HAN, b**  
SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA. Key back in Trojans' single wing offense. Power runner and also good tackler. Excels in rugby and played with American team in Australia.



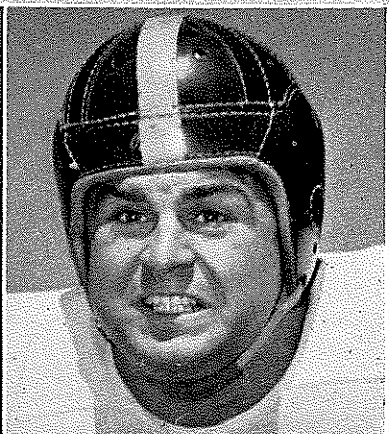
**VERYL SWITZER, b**

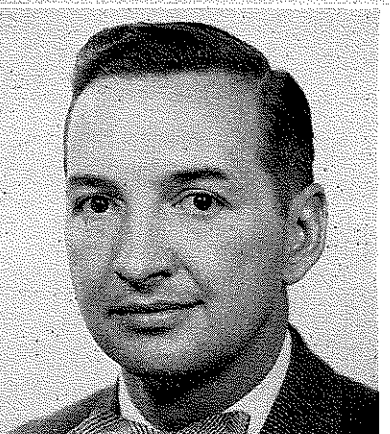
**TED CONNOR, f**
