Professional and collegiate sports are extremely popular and visible arenas; participation in and partnerships or affiliations with these types of events can add new dimensions to marketing, awareness and fundraising efforts. In January of 2019, a new staff position for Shriners Hospitals for Children – director, sports management – was created to elevate our presence in this important field.

Bob Roller, former athletic director of Campbell University in Buies Creek, North Carolina, was selected to serve in this capacity. A short time later, he was also named executive director of the East-West Shrine Bowl.

A HIGHLY RESPECTED, UNIQUE EVENT

"The East-West Shrine Bowl is a premier nationally recognized event. As the longest running game of its kind in the country, people are aware of this game," said Roller. "The game is becoming a strong testing ground for NFL initiatives, and we want to strengthen that relationship."

In addition, the game is unique in that, through the players' visit to the local Shriners Hospital, it provides a clear understanding of the work the game supports, truly making it "More than just a game."

"This sets us apart from all other college football all-star games," said Roller.

Overseeing the East-West Shrine Bowl includes planning for and choosing 150 players, recruiting coaches and scouts from every NFL team, as well as looking after a lengthy list of details, including tickets, concessions and even the entertainment.

Roller's 30 years of experience in college athletics will be very helpful to the players who are trying to gain the attention of the NFL. "I understand these seniors, and bring a unique perspective to this aspect of the game," said Roller. "It's a job interview for them."

An effort the size of this one requires the commitment and dedication of countless individuals, including volunteers. "I really want to thank the Shriners – and all the volunteers – for their months of hard work," said Roller.

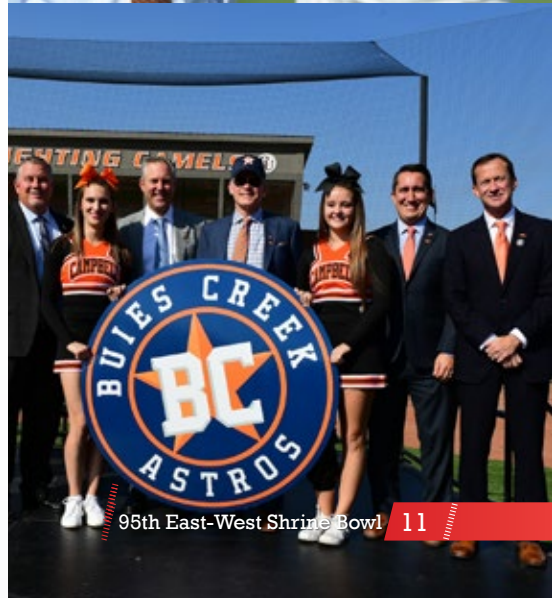
This year, Roller added some touches to make the game a little more family-friendly, including the Fun Zone on the field during the pre-game events. "We hope it will be like having a kid-friendly party on the field."

"It is an incredibly affordable, family-friendly event, as well as being high-quality football," said Roller. "We hope to continue to attract more families."

QUALIFIED TO MEET THE CHALLENGE

Roller is highly experienced and well qualified for these responsibilities. His experience includes more than 30 years in athletic management and 18 years of national marketing, including serving for three years as the Orange Bowl Committee's director of communications and seven years as vice president of college sports for Host Communications. During his time at Campbell University, Roller served on the NCAA Division I Football Championship Committee. Roller also had a 10-year stint as the director of athletics for Samford University's 15-sport program.

He holds a Master of Science in Education Administration from Samford University in Birmingham, Alabama, and has a Bachelor of Arts in Journalism and Mass Communications from Virginia Tech University in Blacksburg, Virginia. Roller is a member of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics, National Association of Athletic Directors of Development and College Sports Information Directors of America.

STATE-OF-THE-ART SPECIALTY CARE

The first Shriners Hospital opened in Shreveport, Louisiana, primarily to help children who had contracted polio. A unique pediatric health care system has grown from that single location – one with international reach and global vision. At our locations in the U.S., Canada and Mexico, children receive quality care for orthopaedic conditions, burns, spinal cord injuries, and cleft lip and palate, regardless of the families' ability to pay for services. In addition, our outreach clinics bring care to children around the world.

LEADING THE WAY IN ORTHOPAEDICS

Today, the majority of our locations provide care for virtually all pediatric orthopaedic conditions. Shriners Hospitals for Children also offers a range of multidisciplinary services, including physical, occupational and recreation therapies; orthotics and prosthetics; and transitions programs to help our patients become happy, productive adults.

PIONEERING BURN CARE

The Shriners Hospitals for Children specializing in burns have been leaders in the field since opening in the mid-1960s. Shriners Hospitals provide critical, surgical and rehabilitative care for all degrees of burn injuries, as well as other skin conditions. Some advances made through our research include increased survival rates, methods to minimize scarring and improved wound-healing techniques.

DELIVERING EXCELLENCE IN SPINAL CORD INJURY REHABILITATION

Recognizing a need for spinal cord injury rehabilitation programs specifically for children, we have developed programs that offer innovative therapies, emotional support, and training in independent living skills. In addition to therapy, exercise and activity-based rehabilitation are emphasized.

PROVIDING EXPERTISE IN CLEFT LIP AND PALATE CARE

Facial clefts are one of the most common birth defects in the U.S., yet comprehensive care for patients with cleft lip and palate can be difficult to obtain. At Shriners Hospitals for Children, patients are cared for by a multidisciplinary team. Custom treatment plans may include surgery, orthodontics, and hearing, speech and psychological therapies.

DEDICATION TO RESEARCH AND EDUCATION

Shriners Hospitals for Children strives to discover answers that will one day improve lives by conducting high-quality, innovative research. Our researchers have made significant breakthroughs that are improving the care and quality of life for children worldwide, while adding to the global body of medical knowledge.

By maintaining relationships with medical teaching facilities, Shriners Hospitals for Children fosters an academic environment committed to providing superior education for medical professionals and quality care to all patients. Many of our care providers are dedicated to helping medical professionals in other countries, in order to help more children receive care closer to home.

ENCOURAGING ACTIVITIES; BUILDING SKILLS AND SELF-CONFIDENCE

From archery to wheelchair basketball, there are more activities for children with disabilities than ever before. Shriners Hospitals for Children offers opportunities to participate in a wide range of programs and activities, helping our patients have fun, gain confidence, learn about physical fitness and discover limitless amazing possibilities.

BOSTON /////

One of the most popular recreation therapy programs at the Boston Shriners Hospital is Team Brave, administered in partnership with the Boston Firefighters Burn Foundation. The program pairs firefighters with patients who spend time together on adventures outside the hospital. Team members have spent afternoons at the aquarium, visited butterfly gardens, created paintings and pottery and even learned how to make fresh pasta. Team Brave helps patients build confidence while having fun.

CHICAGO /////

Recreational therapy at Shriners Hospitals for Children — Chicago provides year round F.L.O.W. (Friendship, Leisure, Opportunity & Wellness) programming, including indoor and outdoor golf. In the summer months, a weekly therapeutic horseback riding programs with Horsefeathers Therapeutic Riding is offered. Patients learn about horses, basic care of the animals and get to take supervised guided rides.

ERIE /////

The Mighty Otters sled hockey team started in 1997. Sled hockey follows regular ice hockey rules, but the players are seated on specially designed sleds. Participants propel themselves across the ice by means of a special hockey stick. The Erie Adaptive Sailing Experience (EASE) offers youth with disabilities the opportunity to sail independently using specially designed access dinghies.

LEXINGTON /////

The medical center hosts NoLimits Sports Camps throughout the year for patients ages 5-18. The medical center usually collaborates with at least one Kentucky university, and their team members help the patients learn to play a specific sport, as well as the importance of stretching, conditioning and eating the right foods.



NORTHERN CALIFORNIA /////

For eight consecutive Friday mornings this past summer, 23 patients arrived at the hospital to participate in the BikeFit exercise program. They participated in water games, disco dancing and, of course, cycling. Each BikeFit participant was fitted with an adaptive cycle, which they were able to take home after successfully completing the program.

PORTLAND /////

At the Portland Shriners Hospital, the patients have opportunities to participate in many activities, including gymnastics, swimming, rock climbing, art, music, skiing and snowboarding. All activities are adapted to meet the patients' individual needs.

SALT LAKE CITY /////

The Un-Limb-ited camps are for teen patients of Shriners Hospitals for Children living with limb loss or deficiency. These camps offer a unique opportunity for teens to gain confidence and form strong bonds with other amputees while learning either adaptive skiing and snowboarding or whitewater river rafting and camping in the Utah wilderness.

SPRINGFIELD /////

Specifically designed for patients ages 5-21 with a neuromuscular condition, such as cerebral palsy, BFit offers two individualized power training exercise programs that are designed to help improve strength and function. One is an exercise-based program and the other emphasizes cycling.

ST. LOUIS /////

Hand Camp, one of only a few of its kind in the nation, is a weekend retreat for children ages 6-12 with hand or upper limb differences and their families. It provides opportunities to go horseback riding and try archery, rock wall climbing and fishing, as well as learn from older patients who are junior counselors. The hospital also offers an aquatic therapy for patients undergoing limb lengthening and reconstruction.

TWIN CITIES /////

Camp Achieve is an activity for patients with limb deficiencies. Paddle boarding, swimming, tubing, horseback riding, bowling, fishing and more are offered at the camp. Camp Splash is a weeklong swim camp held at the location's pool, and is taught by volunteer swim instructors.



THE PATH TO THE NFL FOR COLLEGE FOOTBALL'S FINEST

Created by the Shriners fraternity in 1925, the East-West Shrine Bowl supports Shriners Hospitals for Children while showcasing the next generation of NFL legends.

An invitation to take part in the annual East-West Shrine Bowl is an once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for the best senior collegiate football all-stars in the country to showcase their talents in front of top representatives of NFL teams. A strong performance in the game greatly impacts a player's chances of a career in the NFL. Many of professional football's most recognized and decorated players, including Tom Brady, Brett Favre and John Elway, played in the East-West Shrine Bowl.

More than 100 players from last year's game signed with professional teams last spring, and more than 70 made final NFL rosters last season. On average, more than 300 East-West Shrine Bowl alumni are on NFL rosters each year. Since the game's inception, 78 former players have been inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. More than 200 former players have been named to the College Football Hall of Fame.



TOM BRADY

East-West Shrine Bowl: 2000

Team / Position: East / QB

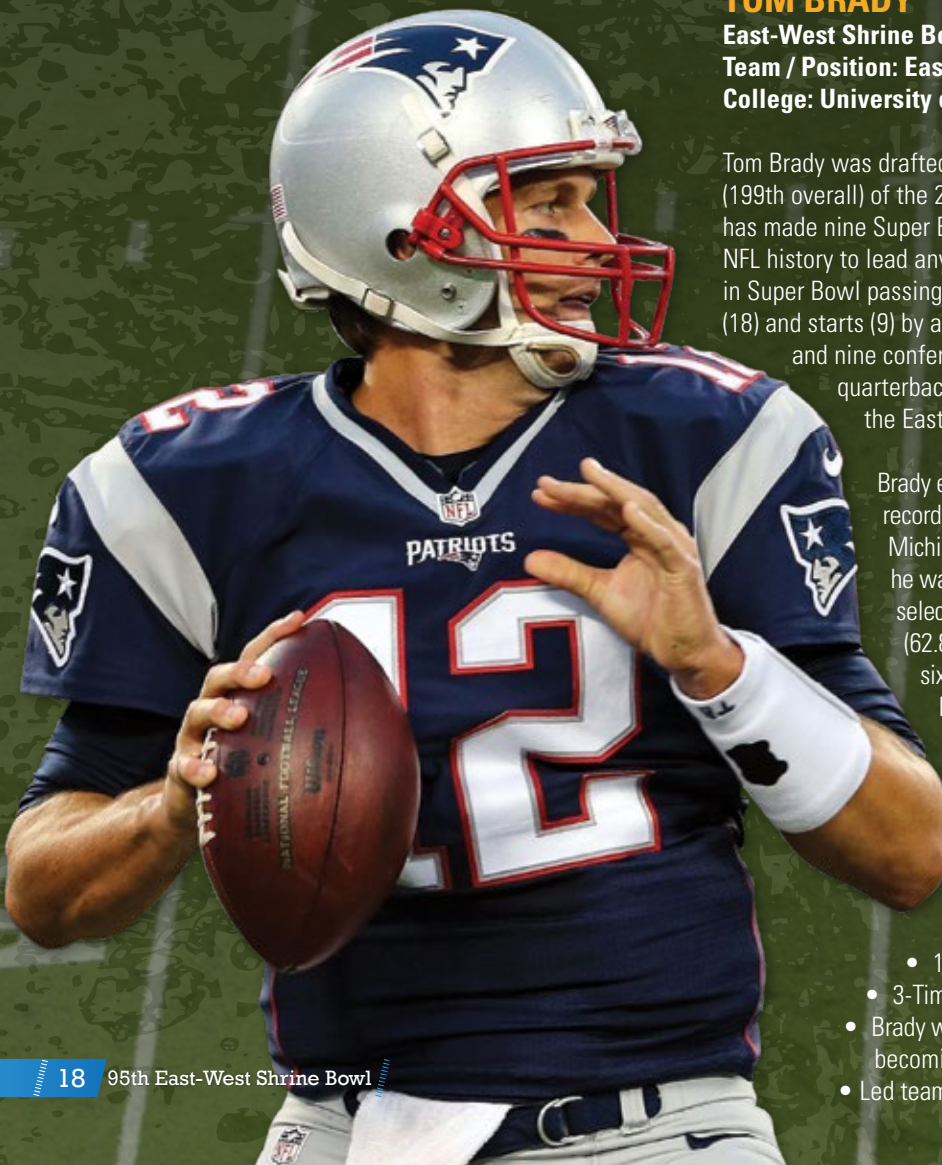
College: University of Michigan

Tom Brady was drafted by the New England Patriots in the sixth round (199th overall) of the 2000 NFL Draft. Since his time with the Patriots, he has made nine Super Bowl appearances. Brady is the first quarterback in NFL history to lead any team to six Super Bowl wins. He's the all-time leader in Super Bowl passing yards (2,838), completions (256), touchdown passes (18) and starts (9) by a quarterback. His 13 conference title game starts and nine conference championships are the most of any starting quarterback in the Super Bowl era. Before his NFL career, he was the East-West Shrine Bowl MVP in 2000.

Brady earned three letters at Michigan and recorded a 20-5 record as a two-year starter. When he was a junior, he led Michigan to the Big Ten title in 1998. As a senior in 1999, he was named an All-Big Ten Conference second-team selection and team MVP after completing 214 of 341 passes (62.8 percent) for 2,586 yards, 20 touchdowns and only six interceptions. He finished his career ranking third in Michigan history with 710 attempts and 442 completions, fourth with 5,351 yards and a 62.3 completion percentage and fifth with 35 touchdown passes.

AKIEM HICKS

East-West Shrine Bowl: 2012

Team / Position: East / DL

College: University of Regina

Defensive tackle Akiem Hicks is in his fourth season with the Chicago Bears (eighth season in the NFL). He was drafted by the New Orleans Saints in the third round (89th overall) of the 2012 NFL Draft. He became the ninth Canadian Interuniversity Sport (CIS) player to be selected in the NFL draft, and the second highest NFL draft pick in CIS history. During his time with the Saints, Hicks's statistic of 119 tackles was ranked second among the defensive linemen from 2012-2015. In 2016, Hicks ranked third in the NFL among defensive tackles. While in the NFL, he has played for the Saints (2012-2015), Patriots (2015), and Bears (2016-present). In 2012, Hicks played in the East-West Shrine Bowl.

In the 2018 season with the Bears, Hicks was named to his first Pro Bowl. He started 16 games, recording 55 tackles, 7.5 sacks, 12 tackles for loss, five pass breakups and three forced fumbles. He recorded a career-high with five tackles for loss against Minnesota. He also scored on a one-yard touchdown run against the New York Giants. That season he led the team in tackles for loss and was second on the team in sacks.

Hicks played college football at Sacramento City College and the University of Regina. While at SCC (2007-08) he was an All-American as a sophomore, and posted 65 tackles in 17 games. In his 2010-11 season at Regina, he started all 16 games, recording 76 tackles, eight sacks, four forced fumbles, and 13 TFLs. He was named an All-Canada West All-Star as a junior, starting all eight games and recording 34 tackles, one and a half sacks, five TFLs, two forced fumbles, and one pass. As a senior, Hicks recorded 42 tackles, eight TFLs, six and a half sacks, two forced fumbles and three pass breakups, which led to him earning All-Canadian Interuniversity Sports honors.

JIMMY GAROPPOLO

East-West Shrine Bowl: 2014

College: Eastern Illinois University

Jimmy Garoppolo was drafted in the second round of the 2014 NFL Draft by the New England Patriots. While he was with the Patriots he won two Super Bowls. He is now the starting quarterback for the San Francisco 49ers. His 1,542 passing yards in his first five starts with the team are the most by a 49ers QB in their first five starts in franchise history.

This season Garoppolo has made a huge improvement with the franchise. With 424 yards and four touchdowns against Arizona, he joined Hall of Fame quarterbacks Joe Montana and Steve Young as the only quarterbacks in franchise history to throw for over 400 yards and four touchdowns in a game. In his game against the Saints, he completed 26 of 35 attempts for 349 yards and four touchdowns with a passer rating of 131.7. Garoppolo's record as a starting quarterback in the NFL is an impressive 20-5 (as of December 26).

In the 2014 East-West Shrine Bowl, Garoppolo led the East Team on a 66-yard touchdown drive in the final 51 seconds of the first half. He was named the 89th game's Offensive MVP, completing nine of 14 passes for 100 yards and one touchdown.

Garoppolo registered 13,089 yards in total offense at Eastern Illinois, joining Saints head coach Sean Payton (10,298 yards; 1983-86) as the only players in EIU history to generate at least 10,000 yards in total offense. Following his senior season, he received the Walter Payton Award. The Award is given to the most outstanding offensive player in the Division I Football Championship Subdivision.

Cristian was born with spina bifida and hydrocephalus. Cristian has faced many of the same challenges that often confront patients with spina bifida, including gastro-intestinal system and balance issues, as well as complications from various surgeries. For several years, his family had difficulty finding doctors who knew how best to help Cristian.

That all changed one day in 2012, when Cristian met Jack Richardson of Zelzah Shriners who referred him to Shriners Hospitals for Children. Cristian was 13 when he had the surgery that he says changed his life and gave him hope, at Shriners Hospitals for Children — Los Angeles (now Shriners for Children Medical Center in Pasadena, California).

Devoted to his schoolwork, seminary studies, a part-time job and playing the cello, Cristian has also been actively supporting Shriners Hospitals for Children. He even dedicated his Eagle Scout project to the cause.

Cristian is enjoying his role as a National Patient Ambassador. "I know that I am who I am because of the Shriners," he said. "I have been able to see that I can do whatever I want, and I can overcome any obstacle that I face. I want to give back to them because of that — because of the life that they've given me. Through Shriners Hospitals for Children and the national ambassadorship that I've been given, I hope to share a message of positivity and hope to all those who need it."

MEET MADELYN

Madelyn's journey with Shriners Hospitals for Children began with her first visit to our St. Louis location when she was just 3 months old. She had been born 10 weeks early and without her left arm. Throughout her childhood, Madelyn used prosthetics, mainly for balance and to help with various activities. Occupational therapists at the hospital helped Madelyn learn to function and interact in the world. As she grew older, Madelyn began using her prosthetics less often, and by middle school, she opted to stop using them.

In school, Madelyn's busy schedule included not only her classwork but also competitive swimming, first on a team for children with disabilities, then on her high school team. She also participated in competitive, coed water polo. "Nothing is impossible in my mind," she said.

Madelyn has always devoted herself to advocating and educating. She loves to make YouTube videos showing how to accomplish things using only one arm, and she enjoys telling her story at events. Drawing from her own experiences of being bullied, Madelyn likes to incorporate anti-bullying themes into her presentations. A student at Maryville University in St. Louis, Madelyn is active in student activities and made the Dean's List her first two semesters.

"I am incredibly excited to see where this year takes me," Madelyn said. "I hope to inspire other kids and be able to show them that they can do anything they put their mind to — they might just do it a little bit differently."

You may recognize Alec from TV commercials for Shriners Hospitals for Children, or you may have seen him in any of several other venues. Alec is a patient of Shriners Hospitals for Children — Chicago who has become a popular television star and been interviewed on national news and talk shows. Now 17, Alec has captured the hearts of many with his charm and personality.

THE STORY BEHIND THE STAR

The high school senior is an active teen who enjoys his classes and is applying to colleges. When he's not in school, you can find Alec on the basketball court with his friends or working out at home. Alec's approach to his favorite activities is a little different, however, since he has osteogenesis imperfecta (OI), also known as brittle bone disease.

OI is a genetic bone disorder characterized by fragile bones that can frequently and easily break, which can make it hard for Alec to participate in sports. The underlying cause of OI is a lack of collagen — or abnormal collagen — in the bones that prevents them from absorbing appropriate minerals and developing correctly.

Alec has been receiving care at the Chicago Shriners Hospital for treatment since 2002. Over the years, he's made great progress with the help of customized treatment from our rehabilitation specialists. Alec, who has had several surgeries, receives intravenous medication infusions and physical therapy.

"I do aquatic therapy when time allows," the busy teen said. "I love the pool at the Chicago Shriners Hospital during the cold winter months."

Thanks to the outstanding care and innovative treatment Alec receives at the Chicago Shriners Hospital, his muscles are strengthening and his bones are breaking less often. This provides Alec with more opportunities to indulge in his passion for sports.

DREAMS BECOME REALITY

The health care system is dedicated to improving the quality of life of patients and families. Knowing that Alec hopes to be a sports broadcaster someday, hospital staff members enjoy helping to nurture this ambition. During the NFL Draft weeks in 2015, 2016 and 2017, Alec conducted interviews with players during community visits attended by patients of Shriners Hospitals for Children. At the 2018 and 2019 East-West Shrine Bowls, Alec attended team practices and went on camera in the NFL Network announcer booth.

"East-West Shrine Bowl games are a favorite event for me," Alec said. "It's always a fun time when you can hang out with players and talk sports with them. Last year I had the opportunity to build a bond with Cody Barton, a linebacker who was presented with the Pat Tillman Award and who was drafted in the third round of the NFL draft."



Last fall Alec attended his third Shriners Hospital for Children Open, a professional golf tournament in Las Vegas, where he hosted a new live show, *Off the Green with Alec*. "That was a personal highlight for me," Alec said. "I loved every minute of it, and I hope our audience enjoyed it as much as I did."

THE EAST-WEST SHRINE BOWL: 95 YEARS OF TRADITION

While the East-West Shrine Bowl has a new name this year, its tradition remains unchanged. The longest-running college all-star football game in the country, the East-West Shrine Bowl dates back to 1925 and has consistently proven to be a milestone for players seeking a professional career in football.

The East-West Shrine Bowl has come a long way since its inception decades ago in San Francisco, California. Prior to 1925, the event was a charity baseball game between Islam Shriners (since renamed Asiya Shriners) and the Elks. Seeking to generate more excitement for the fundraiser, Shriners team captain E. Jack Spaulding realized an all-star football game featuring top college players might be more successful. And the concept of the East-West Shrine Game was born.

DEDICATED VOLUNTEER HELPS ENSURE SUCCESS OF EAST-WEST SHRINE BOWL

The East-West Shrine Bowl has been a tradition in the worlds of football and of Shriners Hospitals for Children for 95 years. The always-memorable event appears magical and seamless to audiences – and making that happen depends on the skill and dedication of numerous people behind the scenes. One of the most devoted is surely Tom Reeves, director of game operations.

“Tom is the pulse of the East-West Shrine Bowl and is one of our game’s most passionate supporters,” said Bob Roller, director of sports management for Shriners Hospitals for Children and Executive Director of the East-West Shrine Bowl. “He has been one of the most constant denominators we have for more than 25 years, and, like many other volunteers, his only motivation is to promote Shriners Hospitals for Children and this 95-year-old, all-star event.”

For Reeves, a lifelong sports fan and football aficionado, the event has always been all about the young patients of Shriners Hospitals. The Oregon State University graduate and business owner was moved to become a Mason and Shriner in 1997, after he attended the East-West Shrine Bowl and had the opportunity to participate in the traditional players visit to the local Shriners Hospital.

COMMITTED TO THE PHILANTHROPY

It was a life-changing event that led him to deepen his involvement and commit to serving Shriners Hospitals for Children. “Tom started attending the East-West Shrine Bowl with a friend who was a Shriner,” his wife, Debbie, said. “Seeing how the game helps children and knowing that it’s an important fundraiser for Shriners Hospitals, he decided he needed to be a part of such a great philanthropy.”

Reeves went on to become, in many ways, the glue that holds the event together. He’s been involved with the Oregon East-West Shrine Game, which is played during the summer in Baker City, Oregon, including serving for three years as the game committee chairman. He also served on the Board of Governors for the Portland Shriners Hospital for Children in Portland, Oregon, and is currently an emeritus member of the board.

He has also held many positions on behalf of the East-West Shrine Bowl, played annually

in January. After several years in the role of east team manager, Reeves was asked if he would accept a position as the director of game operations. Naturally he agreed. The role involved commuting monthly from his home in Oregon to Tampa, Florida, where the Shriners organizations are based. In 2015, to be closer to the game and Shriners International headquarters, Reeves and his wife moved to the Tampa Bay area.

MORE THAN JUST A FOOTBALL GUY

In the course of working with the game, Reeves has said he transformed “from just a football guy to a guy who uses football for anything we can for Shriners Hospitals for Children.”

Reeves has just the right mix of skills that make him a perfect fit for the job. “He’s the spoon that stirs the pot,” Debbie Reeves said. “He’s detail-oriented with excellent people skills.”

Reeves’ experience and knowledge of the game are clearly an asset. However, it’s the heart he brings to his work that truly sets Reeves apart, demonstrating that the event is truly “More than just a game” for him.

There are many stories of his positive interactions with Shriners Hospitals for Children families, and he’s known to be a strong advocate for patients as well. His wife recalls a particular conversation he had with a player’s parent, who arrived at the event not knowing very much about Shriners Hospitals’ patients but after talking with Reeves came away with a much deeper appreciation for the cause of children’s specialty health care.

Because of his passion for the game and devotion to the patients of Shriners Hospitals for Children, the East-West Shrine Bowl is proud to count Reeves as one of its most dedicated supporters.





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THE PAT TILLMAN AWARD

HONORING A LEGACY OF SERVICE

In 2005, East-West Shrine Bowl officials created the Pat Tillman Award to recognize true leaders, both on and off the football field. Pat Tillman, a former NFL football player and decorated member of the U.S. Army, sacrificed his life in service to his country after the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks on the U.S. The award would be the game's top honor.

"It is a true honor for our game to be associated with the name Pat Tillman," said Bob Roller, executive director of the East-West Shrine Bowl. "The fact that he gave up a lucrative career to defend our country is a testament to how special he was. He is truly commendable."

The award, given each year in memory of Tillman, honors the player who best exemplifies intelligence, sportsmanship and service. The honor celebrates a student athlete's outstanding achievements and conduct, in and out of the game.

UTAH'S CODY BARTON HONORED WITH 2019 AWARD

Throughout his career, Cody Barton has demonstrated a relentless drive and great awareness on the field, frustrating offenses like the man for which the award is named. He registered 92 tackles, including 10.5 for a loss, 3.5 sacks, and an interception over 53 games. His Shrine Bowl coaches describe him as a true leader who outworked everyone in practices, had a smile on his face the entire week, and understands the true meaning of the Shrine Bowl with his interactions with the patients at Shriners Hospitals for Children.

"Pat Tillman's ideals, strength and convictions made him an American hero, so winning this award is a tremendous honor," said Utah head coach Kyle Whittingham. "Cody has embodied the values associated with the Pat Tillman Award during his career at Utah."

Barton started his Shrine Bowl experience with a visit to Shriners Healthcare for Children — Tampa, where he played with patients on the basketball court, taking photos and signing autographs. He spent the week practicing with his teammates under West head coach Adam Zimmer, linebackers coach for the Minnesota Vikings.

"I am very grateful to receive this award and to everyone who makes it possible," said Barton. "Pat Tillman was a great leader, a humble man who served others, who stepped away from the spotlight to serve our country. This week was a great experience to reach out to others and touch their lives."

THE MAN BEHIND THE AWARD

Pat Tillman was born November 6, 1976, in San Jose, California, to Mary and Patrick Tillman. The oldest of three, Tillman was a deeply caring brother and son, and driven to succeed. In high school, Tillman excelled in football and led his team to the Central Coast Division 1 Football Championship and received a football scholarship from Arizona State University in 1994. Earning a 3.8 GPA and numerous student athlete awards, Tillman also excelled academically.

While at Arizona State, Tillman led his school to an undefeated season, a Rose Bowl appearance and was named the Pac-10 Defensive Player of the Year. Later that year, Tillman went on to be the defensive MVP of the 1998 East-West Shrine Bowl.

Tillman's strength and perseverance impressed the Arizona Cardinals, and they selected him in the seventh round of the NFL Draft. Tillman soon became the team's starting safety, and in 2000, he broke the franchise record with 224 tackles.

After the events of Sept. 11 and the U.S. invasion in the Middle East, Tillman put his professional football career on hold and joined the U.S. Army. Following a tour of duty, Tillman and his brother, Kevin, were called to Afghanistan as part of Operation Mountain Storm. On April 22, 2004, Tillman was killed on a mission in Eastern Afghanistan. His sacrifice was recognized and mourned throughout the nation.

Although the life of this extraordinary person was short, Tillman provided us with many unforgettable football moments, honorable service to the country and an approach to life we all should aspire to follow.



LEGEND SPOTLIGHT: BRETT FAVRE

Brett Favre, a native of Gulfport, Mississippi, and a member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame, still owns more than 170 NFL records a decade after he last retired. His streaks of 297 straight regular season starts and 321 including playoff games, span 19 years and three teams (Green Bay Packers, New York Jets and Minnesota Vikings). Favre appeared in the 66th East-West Shrine Bowl in Stanford, California following an incredible season at the University of Southern Mississippi and was selected as one of that game's Most Outstanding Players. Favre was inducted into the East-West Shrine Bowl Hall of Fame in January 2018.



The East-West Shrine Bowl Hall of Fame is home to some of the greatest names ever to play the game. Each year, past players are selected to join this elite club. Candidates must have played in the East-West Shrine Bowl and have accomplished something significant in their career.

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2020 HALL OF FAME INDUCTEE

WILL SHIELDS (1993)



Will Shields is a former college and professional football player who was an offensive guard in the NFL for 14 seasons and was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2015. He was selected in the third round (74th overall) by the Kansas City Chiefs in the 1993 NFL Draft. Throughout his seasons with the Chiefs, Shields never missed a game. He played in 224 games, three All-Pro Selections, and went to 12

straight Pro Bowls. He also won four division titles, made six playoff appearances and was named to the NFL "All-Decade Team" of the 2000s.

In 1992, while at the University of Nebraska, Shields became the fifth player in school history to win the Outland Trophy. He helped the Huskers win national rushing titles in three of his four seasons at Nebraska (1989, 1991, 1992). In his junior year, he was selected to the All-Big Eight team and was a second-team All-American. During his senior year, he received votes for Big Eight Offensive Player of the Year and earned All-American honors from Kodak, AP, UPI, Walter Camp and *Football News*. His number 75 jersey was retired in 1994.

Shields played in the 1993 East-West Shrine Bowl, which, he said, is actually the only exposure he had to NFL coaches. The only team he had a meeting with is the team that drafted him. During that week, he was able to spend time with the children at Shriners Hospitals. "I loved it, it was excellent going there and it's a cool factor being able to give back and be a part of that community," said

Shields. "You've been given a gift or a talent and now you can utilize that to help others."

Although retired, Shields is still heavily involved in helping the community. He has a fitness center in Overland Park, Kansas, and also helps players who are transitioning out of the NFL. His Will to Succeed foundation, which was established in 1993, seeks to "guide & inspire, empower & improve the lives of those less fortunate by providing financial, educational and other everyday resources to those identified as most in need."

2020 HALL OF FAME INDUCTEE

DAN PASTORINI (1971)



Dan Pastorini was the quarterback for Santa Clara University from 1968 to 1971. He was a Second-Team AP Little All-American selection and ranked in the top 10 in nine of the school's all-time passing records. He was drafted third overall by the Houston Oilers in the 1971 NFL Draft.

In 1975, Pastorini was also named to the AFC Pro Bowl team. In 1978, he threw for a

career-high 2,473 yards and 16 touchdowns. After his career with the Oilers, Pastorini was traded to the Oakland Raiders (where he was a member of the 1980 Super Bowl championship team), the Los Angeles Rams, and the Philadelphia Eagles before retiring in 1983.

As the first son of a Shriner to play in the game, participating in the East-West Shrine Bowl was a special honor for Pastorini. "I was fortunate enough to be selected captain of the team and I had a very good game - got MVP of the game and set a record field goal," said Pastorini.

He believes that players should be very proud and very grateful for the opportunity to play in the East-West Shrine Bowl. His performance influenced the Oilers decision to choose him first in the 1971 NFL Draft.

"It represents more than your talent. It represents helping children, which is something that you need to remember throughout your careers, and later on in life, to continue that path and continue to set examples for the youth of America," said Pastorini.

Pastorini felt like he had to reinvent himself for life after football. He was a professional drag racer for a time, but he is most proud of the charitable work that he is involved in. His foundation, Dan Pastorini Charity, assists in raising funds for and awareness of several charities that is close to his heart. The charity has benefited several organizations but he focuses his attention more on Be An Angel, which he has been involved with for 30 years.

He has been selected Chairman of the Board of Be An Angel Foundation, which helps profoundly deaf children, or children with multiple disabilities by helping them obtain the equipment and the care they need to improve their quality of life.

Mike Caldwell entered his first season with the Buccaneers in 2019. Caldwell joined Tampa Bay after having spent the past four seasons working as the assistant head coach/inside linebackers coach with the New York Jets under current Buccaneers Defensive Coordinator Todd Bowles, then the Jets' head coach. During Caldwell's time with the Jets, the team posted one of the best run defenses in the NFL, holding teams to just 4.00 yards per carry, the sixth-lowest figure in the NFL during that span. In Caldwell's first season with the Jets, his unit was part of a defense that set a franchise record with just 83.4 rushing yards allowed per game.

Under Caldwell's guidance, Jets linebackers excelled, posting some of the best statistical seasons of their careers. In 2018, Avery Williamson, a free agent addition to the Jets, led the team in tackles, posting a career-high 120, while chipping in 3.0 sacks to go along with career bests in passes defended (six) and forced fumbles (two). The 2017 season saw Demario Davis post a career-best 135 tackles, while establishing a then career high with 5.0 sacks.

Before his time with the Jets, Caldwell spent two seasons coaching linebackers for the Arizona Cardinals (2013-14). The Cardinals' 2013 unit led the NFL in run defense (84.4 yards allowed per game) while posting the sixth-best overall defense.

Caldwell began his coaching career with the Philadelphia Eagles, working first as a training camp intern (2007) before spending two seasons as a defensive quality control coach (2008-09). He then spent the 2010 season as the Eagles' assistant linebackers coach before being elevated to linebackers coach, a position he held for two seasons (2011-12).

An 11-year NFL veteran, Caldwell played with the Cleveland Browns (1993-95), Baltimore Ravens (1996), Arizona Cardinals (1997), Philadelphia Eagles (1998-2001), Chicago Bears (2002) and Carolina Panthers (2003).

He and his wife, Sue, have three children – two daughters, Sydnei and Saniah, and a son, Simeon. His daughter Sydnei is a freshman basketball player at Arizona State University.

In a continuous effort to connect the game's greats with the next generation of stars, Pro Football Hall of Famer Will Shields and NFL Legends Charlie Brown, Willie McGinest, Bobby Taylor and Amani Toomer will serve as mentors to the 2020 East-West Shrine Bowl players throughout the week.

"The objective for the East-West Shrine Bowl is to provide opportunity for development, evaluation, and community outreach for both the next generation of prospects and coaches," said Troy Vincent, NFL Executive Vice President of Football Operations and 2019 East-West Shrine Bowl Hall of Fame Inductee. "The venue affords prospects an early start on evaluation and assessment by pro personnel. It is also a tremendous opportunity to engage with the children and families at Shriners Hospitals."

For 95 years, some of football's greatest players and coaches have contributed to the tradition of the East-West Shrine Bowl, the nation's first college all-star football game. The East-West Shrine Bowl features some of college football's best prospects, and is live on NFL Network.

"We are thrilled to have these exceptional former NFL stars return as our NFL Legends Mentors and work with our 2020 East-West Shrine Bowl players," said Bob Roller, East-West Shrine Bowl executive director. "The skill and knowledge that the Legends can provide to our players will further their ability to transition to the professional level next season in the NFL."

CHARLIE BROWN >>>

Following a standout college career at South Carolina State, wide receiver Charlie Brown was selected in the eighth round of the 1981 NFL Draft by the Washington Redskins. Brown helped lead the Redskins to a Super Bowl XVII championship and was selected to two consecutive Pro Bowls (1982, 1983). In his retirement, Brown regularly supports Shriners Hospitals for Children at charitable events throughout the year.

WILLIE MCGINEST >>>

A two-time Pro Bowl selection and three-time Super Bowl champion, McGinest was a vital member of the New England Patriots dynasty of the early 2000s. His 15-year NFL career was highlighted by his 12 seasons with New England, where he recorded an NFL-record 16 postseason sacks, including a single-game playoff record 4.5 sacks in the Patriots' 2005 AFC Wild Card game. McGinest, who finished his career with the Cleveland Browns, currently serves as an analyst for the NFL Network.

WILL SHIELDS >>>

A member of the 2015 Pro Football Hall of Fame class, Shields was a 12-time Pro Bowl selection and three-time First-Team All-Pro during his 14-year career with the Kansas City Chiefs. Shields never missed a game at guard throughout his career and was named to the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 2000s. He was named the 2003 Walter Payton Man of the Year for his work with the "Will to Succeed" Foundation, a charitable organization he founded in 1993.

BOBBY TAYLOR >>>

A 10-year NFL veteran, Taylor recorded 19 career interceptions, 10 fumble recoveries and five forced fumbles in 129 games during his career with the Philadelphia Eagles and Seattle Seahawks. During his 2002 Pro Bowl season, Taylor recorded a career-high five interceptions and registered an interception return for a touchdown in the NFC Divisional playoffs to help send the Eagles to the NFC Championship game.

AMANI TOOMER >>>

A 13-year NFL veteran and Super Bowl XLII champion, Toomer is the New York Giants' all-time leader in receptions (668), receiving yards (9,497) and receiving touchdowns (54) during his 190 regular-season games played with the franchise. He also appeared in 11 postseason games and totaled 44 catches for 608 yards and a franchise-best seven touchdowns, including three during the Giants' run to the Super Bowl title in 2007.

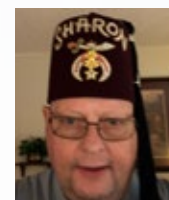

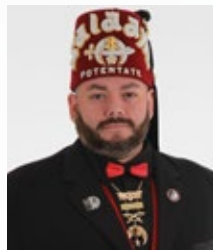

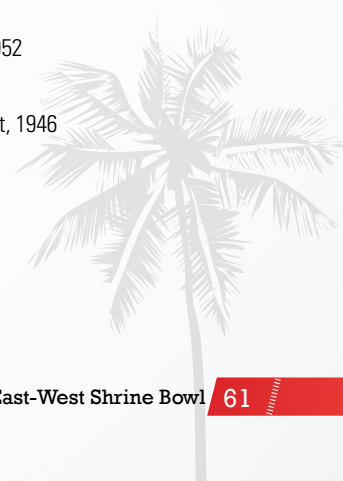
