**Shriners Children's is a unique health care system with a reputation for finding answers and giving families hope. Since 1922, we have helped more than 1.5 million children. This year, we will celebrate a century of helping our patients believe in their dreams and achieve their goals.**

## **INTRODUCING A NEW BRAND**

We are now using the phrase – Shriners Children's to identify our health care system. It fits in well with current trends in health care nomenclature and in today's fast paced world, brief is better. At the same time, the phrase clearly honors our founders, and identifies who we are and what is important to us. We are Shriners and we care for Children.

## **STATE-OF-THE-ART SPECIALTY CARE**

The first Shriners Hospital opened in Shreveport, Louisiana, primarily to help children who had contracted polio. A unique pediatric health care system has grown from that single location – one with international reach and global vision. At our locations in the U.S., Canada and Mexico, children receive quality care for orthopaedic conditions, burns, spinal cord injuries, and cleft lip and palate, regardless of the families' ability to pay or insurance status. In addition, our outreach clinics bring care to children around the world.

## **LEADING THE WAY IN ORTHOPEDICS**

Today, the majority of our locations provide care for virtually all pediatric orthopedic conditions. Shriners Children's also offers a range of multidisciplinary services, including physical, occupational and recreation therapies; orthotics and prosthetics; and transitions programs to help our patients become happy, productive adults.

## **PIONEERING BURN CARE**

The Shriners Children's locations specializing in burns have been leaders in the field since opening in the mid-1960s. Shriners Hospitals provide critical, surgical and rehabilitative care for all degrees of burn injuries, as well as other skin conditions. Some advances made through our research include increased survival rates, methods to minimize scarring and improved wound-healing techniques.

## **EXCELLENCE IN SPINAL CORD INJURY REHABILITATION**

Recognizing a need for spinal cord injury rehabilitation programs specifically for children, we have developed programs that offer innovative therapies, emotional support, and training in independent living skills. In addition to therapy, exercise and activity-based rehabilitation are emphasized.

## **EXPERTISE IN CLEFT LIP AND PALATE CARE**

Facial clefts are one of the most common birth defects in the U.S., yet comprehensive care for patients with cleft lip and palate can be difficult to obtain. At Shriners Children's, patients are cared for by a multidisciplinary team. Custom treatment plans may include surgery, orthodontics, and hearing, speech and psychological therapies.

## **DEDICATION TO RESEARCH AND EDUCATION**

Our researchers strive to discover answers that will one day improve lives by conducting high-quality, innovative research. Our researchers have made significant breakthroughs that are improving the care and quality of life for children worldwide, while adding to the global body of medical knowledge.

By maintaining relationships with medical teaching facilities, Shriners Children's fosters an academic environment committed to providing superior education for medical professionals and quality care to all patients. Many of our care providers are dedicated to helping medical professionals in other countries, in order to help more children receive care closer to home.

## SALUTE TO SERVICE

Known as the "Praise and Worshipper" of St. Louis, Wilson has been singing since the age of five. A native of Missouri, Wilson was born and raised to sing gospel. Wilson has shared the stage with leading gospel artists. He has performed the national anthem and "God Bless America" at numerous large-scale sporting events including five MLB World Series games, multiple NFL playoff games and the men's and women's NCAA Final Four basketball tournaments.

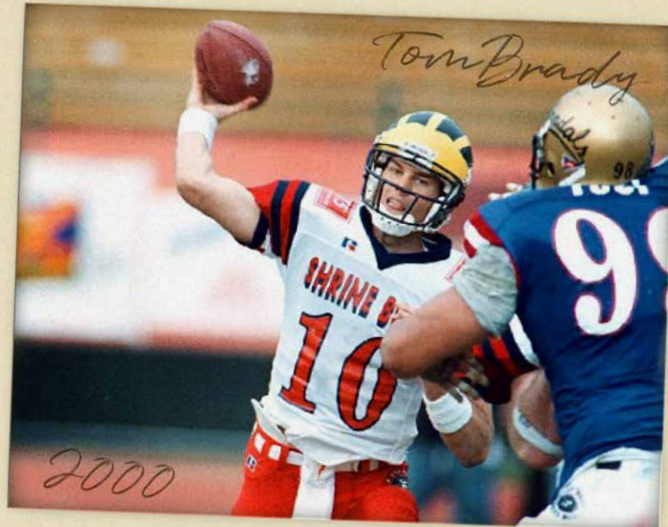


## THE PATH TO THE NFL FOR COLLEGE FOOTBALL'S FINEST

Created by the Shriners fraternity in 1925, the East-West Shrine Bowl supports Shriners Hospitals for Children while showcasing the next generation of NFL legends.

An invitation to take part in the annual East-West Shrine Bowl is an once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for the best senior collegiate football all-stars in the country to showcase their talents in front of top representatives of NFL teams. A strong performance in the game greatly impacts a player's chances of a career in the NFL. Many of professional football's most recognized and decorated players, including Tom Brady, Brett Favre and John Elway, played in the East-West Shrine Bowl.

More than 100 players from last year's game signed with professional teams last spring, and more than 70 made final NFL rosters last season. On average, more than 300 East-West Shrine Bowl alumni are on NFL rosters each year. Since the game's inception, 78 former players have been inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. More than 200 former players have been named to the College Football Hall of Fame.



### TOM BRADY

East-West Shrine Bowl: 2000

Team / Position: East / QB

College: University of Michigan

Tom Brady was drafted by the New England Patriots in the sixth round (199th overall) of the 2000 NFL Draft. Since his time with the Patriots, he has made nine Super Bowl appearances. Brady is the first quarterback in NFL history to lead any team to six Super Bowl wins. He's the all-time leader in Super Bowl passing yards (2,838), completions (256), touchdown passes (18) and starts (9) by a quarterback. His 13 conference title game starts and nine conference championships are the most of any starting quarterback in the Super Bowl era. Before his NFL career, he was the East-West Shrine Bowl MVP in 2000.

Brady earned three letters at Michigan and recorded a 20-5 record as a two-year starter. When he was a junior, he led Michigan to the Big Ten title in 1998. As a senior in 1999, he was named an All-Big Ten Conference second-team selection and team MVP after completing 214 of 341 passes (62.8 percent) for 2,586 yards, 20 touchdowns and only six interceptions. He finished his career ranking third in Michigan history with 710 attempts and 442 completions, fourth with 5,351 yards and a 62.3 completion percentage and fifth with 35 touchdown passes.

## AKIEM HICKS

East-West Shrine Bowl: 2012

Team / Position: East / DL

College: University of Regina

Defensive tackle Akiem Hicks is in his fourth season with the Chicago Bears (eighth season in the NFL). He was drafted by the New Orleans Saints in the third round (89th overall) of the 2012 NFL Draft. He became the ninth Canadian Interuniversity Sport (CIS) player to be selected in the NFL draft, and the second highest NFL draft pick in CIS history. During his time with the Saints, Hicks's statistic of 119 tackles was ranked second among the defensive linemen from 2012-2015. In 2016, Hicks ranked third in the NFL among defensive tackles. While in the NFL, he has played for the Saints (2012-2015), Patriots (2015), and Bears (2016-present). In 2012, Hicks played in the East-West Shrine Bowl.

In the 2018 season with the Bears, Hicks was named to his first Pro Bowl. He started 16 games, recording 55 tackles, 7.5 sacks, 12 tackles for loss, five pass breakups and three forced fumbles. He recorded a career-high with five tackles for loss against Minnesota. He also scored on a one-yard touchdown run against the New York Giants. That season he led the team in tackles for loss and was second on the team in sacks.

Hicks played college football at Sacramento City College and the University of Regina. While at SCC (2007-08) he was an All-American as a sophomore, and posted 65 tackles in 17 games. In his 2010-11 season at Regina, he started all 16 games, recording 76 tackles, eight sacks, four forced fumbles, and 13 TFLs. He was named an All-Canada West All-Star as a junior, starting all eight games and recording 34 tackles, one and a half sacks, five TFLs, two forced fumbles, and one pass. As a senior, Hicks recorded 42 tackles, eight TFLs, six and a half sacks, two forced fumbles and three pass breakups, which led to him earning All-Canadian Interuniversity Sports honors.

## JIMMY GAROPPOLO

East-West Shrine Bowl: 2014

Team / Position: East / QB

College: Eastern Illinois University

Jimmy Garoppolo was drafted in the second round of the 2014 NFL Draft by the New England Patriots. While he was with the Patriots he won two Super Bowls. He is now the starting quarterback for the San Francisco 49ers. His 1,542 passing yards in his first five starts with the team are the most by a 49ers QB in their first five starts in franchise history.

This season Garoppolo has made a huge improvement with the franchise. With 424 yards and four touchdowns against Arizona, he joined Hall of Fame quarterbacks Joe Montana and Steve Young as the only quarterbacks in franchise history to throw for over 400 yards and four touchdowns in a game. In his game against the Saints, he completed 26 of 35 attempts for 349 yards and four touchdowns with a passer rating of 131.7. Garoppolo's record as a starting quarterback in the NFL is an impressive 20-5 (as of December 26).

In the 2014 East-West Shrine Bowl, Garoppolo led the East Team on a 66-yard touchdown drive in the final 51 seconds of the first half. He was named the 89th game's Offensive MVP, completing nine of 14 passes for 100 yards and one touchdown.

Garoppolo registered 13,089 yards in total offense at Eastern Illinois, joining Saints head coach Sean Payton (10,298 yards; 1983-86) as the only players in EIU history to generate at least 10,000 yards in total offense. Following his senior season, he received the Walter Payton Award. The Award is given to the most outstanding offensive player in the Division I Football Championship Subdivision.

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**Every year, Shriners Children's selects National Patient Ambassadors to represent the health care system's patients. The ambassadors spend the year sharing their stories of perseverance in the face of adversity and the ways Shriners Children's has made a dramatic difference in their lives. This year, new National Patient Ambassadors Seth and Sydney will be joined by Connor and Mia, who are continuing their National Patient Ambassador journey after a year interrupted by the coronavirus pandemic. We are honored to have these four impressive young people advocating for our health care system.**

## MEET SETH

Seth was 11 when his doctor noticed a curvature in his spine. They began with a "wait and see" approach, and later treatment from a chiropractor. Still, the curvature of his spine quickly progressed to a severe degree. He and his family learned about Shriners Children's from a social media group focused on the Vertebral Body Tethering (VBT) treatment for scoliosis.

Seth, who is from Fort Wayne, Indiana, underwent VBT surgery at Shriners Children's Philadelphia when he was 13. The surgery, performed by Joshua Pahys, M.D., helped the young athlete quickly return to the playing field. "My pain has been reduced dramatically, my curvature is half what it used to be, and my flexibility is on par with my peers," Seth said.

Seth, now 17, enjoys playing many sports, including football, baseball and basketball, and is now focusing on competitive golf. "VBT has given me the opportunity to perform my best in athletics without the limitations of scoliosis," Seth said. "The extra inch I gained on the operating table didn't hurt on the basketball court either."

## MEET CONNOR

Connor, 14, was born with a bilateral incomplete cleft lip and complete cleft palate involving the hard and soft palate. As a newborn, his condition was so severe that he was even unable to create the suction needed to feed. By the time he was 3 weeks old, he was failing to gain weight and was about to be admitted to a hospital. That's when Connor's family learned about Shriners Children's Chicago.

"I just want to use my time as a National Patient Ambassador to help other kids," Connor said. "I want kids to know that no matter what they look like, or how they walk, or what makes them different – that they shouldn't let anyone else make them feel bad. I want to help other kids feel good about themselves and their differences. I'm excited to make an impact on other Shriners kids' lives and spread awareness about our amazing hospitals and Shriners."

## MEET SYDNEY

Sydney, who is from Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, learned she had scoliosis when she was 10. Her treatment began with bracing, but despite a strict exercise regimen and wearing her brace 23 hours a day for 1½ years, her curvature progressed. Searching for an alternative to spinal fusion surgery, Sydney and her family learned about the VBT treatment option.

Sydney had her VBT procedure at Shriners Children's Philadelphia when she was 12, performed by Steven W. Hwang, M.D. "VBT has allowed Sydney to retain her flexibility and to get back to all the things she loves faster and stronger than ever," said her mother, Melissa.

"To make my scoliosis journey a more positive experience, I had to reach out and to help others," Sydney said. "I said 'yes' to being a National Patient Ambassador because Shriners Hospitals has done so much for me, and I feel I could never repay that. That surgery has changed my life. It has shaped me to be the person I am today."

## MEET MIA

Mia, 16, was born with a severe case of infantile idiopathic scoliosis. Her journey with Shriners Children's began when she was 2, when she was first seen at the St. Louis location. Mia's treatments have included halo traction to gradually straighten and stretch her spine, as well as nearly 20 surgeries.

"I am so honored to be in this position," Mia said. "For as long as I can remember, I have always loved Shriners. Not just because of the life it has given me, but the real love that comes from it. This community consists of the best people, and it truly makes my heart soar to know I'm a large part of it. It makes me proud to know that I will be giving back to a hospital that not only gave me a normal life but is a second home for myself and my family."

# MEET ALEC

## SHRINERS CHILDREN'S SPOKESPERSON

**You may recognize Alec from TV commercials for Shriners Children's, or you may have seen him in any of several other venues. Alec is a patient of Shriners Children's Chicago who has become a popular television star and been interviewed on national news and talk shows. Now 19, Alec has captured the hearts of many with his charm and personality.**

### THE STORY BEHIND THE STAR

Alec is an active teen who enjoys his classes and is applying to colleges. When he's not in school, you can find Alec on the basketball court with his friends or working out at home. Alec's approach to his favorite activities is a little different, however, since he has osteogenesis imperfecta (OI), also known as brittle bone disease.

OI is a genetic bone disorder characterized by fragile bones that can frequently and easily break, which can make it hard for Alec to participate in sports. The underlying cause of OI is a lack of collagen – or abnormal collagen – in the bones that prevents them from absorbing appropriate minerals and developing correctly.

Alec has been receiving care at the Chicago Shriners Hospital for treatment since 2002. Over the years, he's made great progress with the help of customized treatment from our rehabilitation specialists. Alec, who has had several surgeries, receives intravenous medication infusions and physical therapy.

"I do aquatic therapy when time allows," the busy teen said. "I love the pool at the Chicago Shriners Hospital during the cold winter months."

Thanks to the outstanding care and innovative treatment Alec receives at the Chicago Shriners Hospital, his muscles are strengthening and his bones are breaking less often. This provides Alec with more opportunities to indulge in his passion for sports.

### DREAMS BECOME REALITY

The health care system is dedicated to improving the quality of life of patients and families. Knowing that Alec hopes to be a sports broadcaster someday, hospital staff members enjoy helping to nurture this ambition. During the NFL Draft weeks in 2015, 2016 and 2017, Alec conducted interviews with players during community visits attended by patients of Shriners Children's. At the 2018 and 2019 East-West Shrine Bowls, Alec attended team practices and went on camera in the NFL Network announcer booth.

"East-West Shrine Bowl games are a favorite event for me," Alec said. "It's always a fun time when you can hang out with players and talk sports with them. I had the opportunity to build a bond with Cody Barton, a linebacker who was presented with the Pat Tillman Award and who was drafted in the third round of the NFL Draft."

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# 97 YEARS OF TRADITION

While the East-West Shrine Bowl has a new name this year, its tradition remains unchanged. The longest-running college all-star football game in the country, the East-West Shrine Bowl dates back to 1925 and has consistently proven to be a milestone for players seeking a professional career in football.

The East-West Shrine Bowl has come a long way since its inception decades ago in San Francisco, California. Prior to 1925, the event was a charity baseball game between Islam Shriners (since renamed Asiya Shriners) and the Elks. Seeking to generate more excitement for the fundraiser, Shriners team captain E. Jack Spaulding realized an all-star football game featuring top college players might be more successful. And the concept of the East-West Shrine Bowl was born.

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# THE PAT TILLMAN AWARD

## HONORING A LEGACY OF SERVICE

**In 2005, East-West Shrine Bowl officials created the Pat Tillman Award to recognize true leaders, both on and off the football field. Pat Tillman, a former NFL football player and decorated member of the U.S. Army, sacrificed his life in service to his country after the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks on the U.S. The award would be the game's top honor.**

"It is a true honor for our game to be associated with the name Pat Tillman," said Bob Roller, executive director of the East-West Shrine Bowl. "The fact that he gave up a lucrative career to defend our country is a testament to how special he was. He is truly commendable."

The award, given each year in memory of Tillman, honors the player who best exemplifies intelligence, sportsmanship and service. The honor celebrates a student athlete's outstanding achievements and conduct, in and out of the game.

### JAMES MORGAN HONORED WITH 2020 AWARD

Throughout his career, James Morgan has demonstrated a relentless drive and great awareness on the field. He wrapped up his senior season at Florida International leading the team with 2,585 yards passing and 14 scores through the air. His 14 touchdowns added to his career FIU total of 40, which ranked as the second-most all-time in program history.

"It's truly an honor," said Morgan. "You talk about Pat Tillman and the incredible sacrifice he made giving up an NFL dream, what all of us are here working for, to go serve our country and protect our freedom. It really means a lot."

Morgan started his East-West Shrine Bowl experience with a visit to Shriners Children's Florida, where he played with patients on the basketball court, taking photos and signing autographs. He spent the week practicing with his teammates under East Head Coach Mike Caldwell, inside linebackers coach for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

"This entire week spending time with the children of Shriners Hospitals and seeing their attitudes towards life has been an incredible and eye-opening experience, extremely inspirational, and something that will have a lasting impact on me for a long time," said Morgan.

### THE MAN BEHIND THE AWARD

Pat Tillman was born November 6, 1976, in San Jose, California, to Mary and Patrick Tillman. The oldest of three, Tillman was a deeply caring brother and son, and driven to succeed. In high school, Tillman excelled in football and led his team to the Central Coast Division 1 Football Championship and received a football scholarship from Arizona State University in 1994. Earning a 3.8 GPA and numerous student athlete awards, Tillman also excelled academically.

While at Arizona State, Tillman led his school to an undefeated season, a Rose Bowl appearance and was named the Pac-10 Defensive Player of the Year. Later that year, Tillman went on to be the defensive MVP of the 1998 East-West Shrine Bowl.

Tillman's strength and perseverance impressed the Arizona Cardinals, and they selected him in the seventh round of the NFL Draft. Tillman soon became the team's starting safety, and in 2000, he broke the franchise record with 224 tackles.

After the events of Sept. 11 and the U.S. invasion in the Middle East, Tillman put his professional football career on hold and joined the U.S. Army. Following a tour of duty, Tillman and his brother, Kevin, were called to Afghanistan as part of Operation Mountain Storm. On April 22, 2004, Tillman was killed on a mission in Eastern Afghanistan. His sacrifice was recognized and mourned throughout the nation.

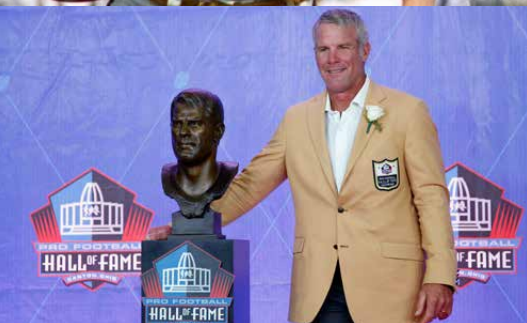
Although the life of this extraordinary person was short, Tillman provided us with many unforgettable football moments, honorable service to the country and an approach to life we all should aspire to follow.





## LEGEND SPOTLIGHT: BRETT FAVRE

Brett Favre, a native of Gulfport, Mississippi, and a member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame, still owns more than 170 NFL records a decade after he last retired. His streaks of 297 straight regular season starts and 321 including playoff games, span 19 years and three teams (Green Bay Packers, New York Jets and Minnesota Vikings). Favre appeared in the 66th East-West Shrine Bowl in Stanford, California following an incredible season at the University of Southern Mississippi and was selected as one of that game's Most Outstanding Players. Favre was inducted into the East-West Shrine Bowl Hall of Fame in January 2018.



The East-West Shrine Bowl Hall of Fame is home to some of the greatest names ever to play the game. Each year, past players are selected to join this elite club. Candidates must have played in the East-West Shrine Bowl and have accomplished something significant in their career.

"The objective for the East-West Shrine Bowl is to provide opportunity for development, evaluation, and community outreach for both the next generation of prospects and coaches," said Troy Vincent, NFL Executive Vice President of Football Operations and 2019 East-West Shrine Bowl Hall of Fame Inductee. "The venue affords prospects an early start on evaluation and assessment by pro personnel. It is also a tremendous opportunity to engage with the children and families at Shriners Hospitals."

For 97 years, some of football's greatest players and coaches have contributed to the tradition of the East-West Shrine Bowl, the nation's first college all-star football game. The East-West Shrine Bowl features some of college football's best prospects, and is live on NFL Network.

"We are thrilled to have these exceptional former NFL stars return as our NFL Legends Mentors and work with our 2022 East-West Shrine Bowl players," said Bob Roller, East-West Shrine Bowl executive director. "The skill and knowledge that the Legends can provide to our players will further their ability to transition to the professional level next season in the NFL."

### **CHARLIE BROWN >>>**

Following a standout college career at South Carolina State, wide receiver Charlie Brown was selected in the eighth round of the 1981 NFL Draft by the Washington Football Team. Brown helped lead Washington to a Super Bowl XVII championship and was selected to two consecutive Pro Bowls (1982, 1983). In his retirement, Brown regularly supports Shriners Children's at charitable events throughout the year.

### **THOMAS DAVIS >>>**

Davis played 16 seasons in the NFL following his college career at the University of Georgia where he was recognized as an All-American. He was drafted by the Carolina Panthers in the first round of the 2005 NFL Draft and played for them as a star linebacker for 14 years. He retired following the 2020 season. Davis was selected to three Pro Bowls (2015, 2016, 2017) and also received the prestigious NFL Walter Payton Man of the Year Award in 2014.

### **DONNIE EDWARDS >>>**

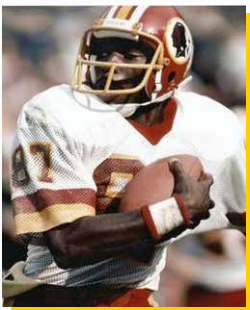
Edwards played for 13 seasons in the NFL for the Chiefs and Chargers. He was an All-American at UCLA in 1995. He was drafted by the Kansas City Chiefs in the fourth round of the 1996 NFL Draft and selected to the 2002 Pro Bowl. Edwards retired as one of only eight players in NFL history to record more than 20 interceptions and 20 sacks during his career. Since his retirement, Edwards has devoted himself to philanthropic work with veterans and underprivileged children.

### **WILL SHIELDS >>>**

A member of the 2015 Pro Football Hall of Fame class, Shields was a 12-time Pro Bowl selection and three-time First-Team All-Pro during his 14-year career with the Kansas City Chiefs. Shields never missed a game at guard throughout his career and was named to the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 2000s. He was named the 2003 NFL Walter Payton Man of the Year for his work with the "Will to Succeed" Foundation, a charitable organization he founded in 1993.

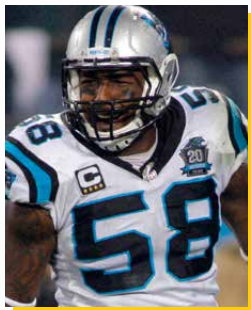
### **STEVEN JACKSON >>>**

A Las Vegas native who spent 12 seasons in the NFL, Jackson was a key piece of the Rams offense from 2004-2012. Jackson played college football at Oregon State and was selected in the first round of the 2004 NFL Draft by the Rams. In his final four seasons, he was a member of the Atlanta Falcons and New England Patriots. Named to three Pro Bowls during his Rams tenure, Jackson is the franchise's all-time leading rusher. During his junior year, he set an Oregon State record for all-purpose yards. Jackson was inducted into the Southern Nevada Sports Hall of Fame in 2011.

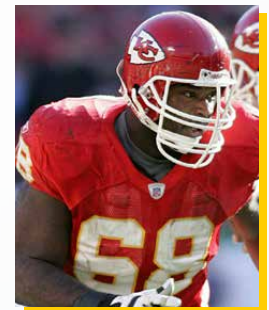

D'Anton Lynn, an eight-year coaching veteran, enters his first season as Baltimore's defensive backs coach. Lynn spent the past three years with the Houston Texans, serving as the team's secondary coach (2020) and assistant secondary coach (2018-19).

During his time as the team's assistant secondary coach, the Texans brought home two-consecutive AFC South titles. As an assistant with the Los Angeles Chargers in 2017, Lynn served under his father, Anthony, working primarily with the linebackers group. He also coached with his father as a defensive assistant with Buffalo (2015-16) and as a seasonal coaching intern with the Jets (2014).

Prior to his NFL coaching career, Lynn was signed by the New York Jets as an undrafted free agent in 2012 before joining the Hamilton Tiger-Cats of the Canadian Football League in 2013.

"D'Anton Lynn is one of the best young coaches in the NFL, and we're excited to allow him the chance to use his 8 years of NFL coaching experience and mentorship from the great coaches he's worked with in his career to be a head coach," said Eric Galko, East-West Shrine Bowl Director of Football Operations, Player Personnel. 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**MARCUS BRADY**  
HEAD COACH

Brady, who will coach the West team, just completed his fourth season with the Colts and first as their offensive coordinator. He previously served as QB coach (2019-20) and Asst. QB coach (2018). Brady has helped Indianapolis reach the playoffs in two of the last four seasons (2018 and 2020).

In 2020, Brady was part of a Colts offense that ranked in the top-10 in the league in points per game (28.2, ninth), rushes of 10-plus yards (64, sixth), and first downs per game (22.8, tied-10th). He worked with quarterback Philip Rivers, who completed 369-of-543 passes for 4,169 yards with 24 touchdowns and 11 interceptions for a 97.0 passer rating. Rivers' completion percentage was the second-best mark in single-season franchise history and ranked eighth in the league. He also finished 10th in the NFL in passing yards in 2020 as he eclipsed 4,000 yards for the eighth time in his career (tied

for the third-most such seasons in league history). Rivers threw for the second-most passing yards in NFL history by a player in their final season. Prior to coaching, Brady played quarterback for seven years in the CFL with the Montreal Alouettes (2006-08), Hamilton Tiger-Cats (2004-05) and Toronto Argonauts (2002-03).

"Marcus Brady is a rising star as an offensive coach after being a part and in 2021 being the offensive coordinator for a top-10 offense in the NFL in Indianapolis," said Eric Galko, East-West Shrine Bowl Director of Football Operations, Player Personnel. "Marcus coached as an offensive coordinator in the 2020 Shrine Bowl, and we're excited to welcome him back in an even elevated role as the West team head coach. He's worked with some of the best QBs and skill players in the NFL in his coaching career, as well as played at high level himself, and we're thankful to give Marcus his first chance to be a head coach."
